Note: This story recollects the excellent adventures of shipmate buddies Dick Pettingill and Bill "Wolf" Wolverton, as told by Dick.

"I'm the other one who successfully swam back to the Fiske in San Remo. I climbed aboard the ship from the fantail, went forward opposite the

Officer's deck and had just finished showering down in full dress (needed to get the salt out of the uniform), when Bill came down the ladder to our "bunk area". I heard him coming and so greeted him at the bottom of the ladder.

Bill was astonished that I not only beat him back to the ship but that I had not drowned. He had turned me in to the Officer of the Day and they had Fiske whale boats out looking for me someplace between

the shore and the boat. It was a very long distance and Bill was sure that in my "drunken state" I must have drowned and would never make it back to the boat. Bill said to me in a mixed reaction "Pettingill, I've turned you in to the officer of the day and they are out looking for you in the whale boats... I thought you'd drowned". His reaction was mixed because he was happy I was alive but concerned because he had turned in his buddy.

Fortunately/luckily I had to stand Captain's Mast and was sentenced to X number of days on board. The expiration of the term was the day of arrival at our next port so there was really no penalty and no record because the Captain liked us both (Bill was a DK3 at the time and I was a recent graduate of the DK school in Newport and so Bill was my "boss".)

I served on the Fiske from 3/55 to 7/57 and then got shore duty in New England where I served out my four-year term.

Bill was reasonably tall, good looking and always with a friendly smile on his face. As you can imagine, being from West Virginia, he had to take a good ribbing from us boys from the north and when we were kind to him we called him "Wolf"."

Ship's Log Entries...

Historian's Report

A majestic ship was she, that sailed the seven seas, we were her crew, we saw it through, and logged our history.



As your historian I feel that it is my duty to seek out every piece of the Fiske story that I can. Back in November I got a phone call from shipmate *Lee Tyler* who asked if I knew anything about the Fiske's involvement in the Lebanon Crisis in 1958. I had to tell him 'no' but that I'd look into it.

My search led me from Wikipedia to OpNav 1650 by a very circuitous route. When the trip was all over, I learned a great deal about Fiske's 1958 Mediterranean cruise that I didn't know before.

Most of the story has already been entered into our *'Incomplete History of the USS Fiske'*.

Long story short - the Fiske was one of many ships that may have been sent to the area near Lebanon for 'Operation Blue Bat' in early June at the order of President Eisenhower. During the 120 days of the crisis about 70 ships - with about 40,000 sailors onboard - and approximately 14,000 US Army and US Marines participated, while the ships that patrolled off shore ground forces were put ashore near Beirut.

These forces formed a perimeter around the port and the city's airport. There is no record of any combat deaths during this operation. One officer apparently died when his .45 caliber sidearm discharged as he was scaling a wall.

American forces were withdrawn

in October. When the smoke had cleared the Christian President, Camille Chamoun, would serve out his term and moderate Christian General Fuad Chehab would become President.

That's the gist of that tale. Just like much of what goes on in the Middle East - a great deal of noise and fury without much being accomplished.

What were the results for the Fiske? Well, the short answer is 'Nothing!'. While one reference says that she was awarded the Armed Forces Expeditionary medal, I cannot verify that through official records. I'll just have to keep digging.

Four Easy Steps:

1 File the claim ASAP. Your benefits, if approved, will start on the date you filed. You'll get a retroactive check back to your filing date, no matter how long it takes.

When you file, you will need a copy of your DD 214, and a good accounting of your medical history from the time you left the service until the date you file. That includes diagnoses, hospitalizations (where, when, what hospital), names and addresses of all the physicians you saw, and so on.

Question: "How do I start a VA Claim?"

Answer: It's easier than you think, shipmates!

You do not need documentation at this point The VA will tell you what you need. File online yourself, or get a Veterans Service Officer from the Legion, VFW, VVA, etc.

2 Gather your data. Meanwhile, write away for your military records, which will include most of your personnel file. Ask your family physician to copy your medical records for you. They should include hospital reports, lab reports, and routine exam reports.

3 Get two self-inking rubber stamps: One with your name, address and phone number. The other with the

claim number you will get from the VA and your social security number.

4 Make copies of everything! *Never send the VA an original document.* Send copies only! Make sure the rubber stamps are applied to the back of every piece of paper you send.
