Charleston is shaping up to be a grand reunion! Beginning Thursday, visit the Hospitality Room, or enjoy activities on your own. Friday and Saturday have planned tours of Patriots Point, the Citadel, and the Magnolia Plantation. The Registration Form insert lists all fees for tickets and transportation. If you are attending, please fill out and return as soon as possible for planning purposes.

One way to travel in the city of Charleston is to reserve space on the hotel shuttle for a 20-minute ride that will take you to the Visitors Center. The fare is \$10.00 round trip.

The Visitors Center has a fivestory parking garage that offers free parking with a handicap placard. Once there, you can hop on a free trolley that runs all around the city on any one of three different routes. Jump off at any of the designated stops to walk around, shop, dine, or visit other attractions; or, take one of several narrated tours. Once back at the Visitors Center, return to the hotel whether by car or shuttle. Hotel parking is free.

An even better way to see the sights is to take one of the many narrated tours that originate from the Visitors Center. Among them are harbor tours, dinner cruises, and a ferry to Ft. Sumter. If you drive, consider car pooling as another option.



Veterans Funding Act

WASHINGTON, D.C. February 26, 2013: Chairman Jeff Miller (FL-01) and Ranking Member Mike Michaud (Maine-02) introduced the Putting Veterans Funding First Act of 2013. The bill would require Congress to fully fund the Department of Veterans Affairs' discretionary budget a year ahead of schedule, ensuring that all VA services will have timely, predictable funding in an era where continuing resolutions and threats of government shutdowns are all too frequent.

'If there is one thing people in Washington and across America agree on, it's that we should never let funding for veterans become a casualty of Washington gridlock. I'm proud to introduce this bipartisan bill, which would simply enact into law the widely accepted view that America's veterans should not be held responsible for Washington's inability to reach an agreement on how to cut spending. Our veterans were there for us when we needed them the most, and the Putting Veterans Funding First Act of 2013 will ensure they have our support during their time of need." Miller said.

Currently, Congress funds the medical care portion – roughly 86 percent of VA's discretionary budget – at the beginning of each fiscal year. Providing the remainder of the discretionary budget – roughly \$8 billion – up front would make it easier for VA to plan for key investments in information technology, claims processing and construction projects. ...continued on page 7

It would also give Congress a greater level of oversight on multi-year funding proposals, with one year building off of the next. During the 112th Congress, members of the Veterans' Affairs Committee fought to ensure that VA would be completely exempt from cuts under the sequester, and this bill is an extension of those efforts, supporters say.

"Our veterans sacrificed all they had for our protection, now it's up to us to protect the care and benefits they have earned for their service. The Putting Veterans Funding First Act of 2013 is a common-sense approach to ensuring that arbitrary budget cuts won't jeopardize the care and benefits America has promised our veterans, and I am proud to cosponsor it," Michaud said.

from the 2nd Vice President


One of best bargains around has to be the \$10.00 membership dues that we solicit every year from shipmates.

Historian's Report

Attn: 70's Crew Members:

I am in dire need of your stories about your time aboard the Fiske for our soon-to-be-published book "FISKE TALES". Please email me asap at VINTAGE40@FRONTIER.COM!

'm looking forward to being in Charleston this September! I'm excited for three reasons: First, the Yorktown - who spent her last year of active service (late 1969 to mid-1970) as an ASW carrier operating with the Atlantic fleet - so there is a chance that Fiske was part of her "Hunter-Killer" group at one time or another.

Secondly, the Laffey was part of TF77 off the east coast of Korea in early 1951 – the same time the Fiske was part of TF77. Laffey also did counter-battery fire against North Korean targets during that deployment so they possibly operated together.

I'm still looking through the rest of the Laffey history for any other linkages.

And third, the Clagamore is intimately connected to Fiske, acting as the 'quarry' during ASW exercises in late October 1971.

It has been reported that 'at approximately 2200 hours on 10 October Fiske and Clagamore collided'. Apparently Clagamore tried to surface while under Fiske. A report from Shipmate Russ Sheridan said that Clagamore collided with Fiske's port side forward, rolled under, recontacting starboard side aft.

Both vessels reported 'minor exterior damage' but note should be taken that Clagamore was decommissioned about 18 months later. Additionally, Shipmate Sheridan says that much of Clagamore sail-mounted antennas were missing when she surfaced.

Clagamore immediately detached and headed for New London, while Fiske continued to participate in the exercise and returned to Newport in early November. I can't help but think

Patriots Point Tour & Citadel Parade Review

Among the contents of the goodie bag and registration package you'll receive will be a booklet listing great places to eat and shop in the city.

In addition to the tours, we've suggested several other activities; maps and tourist guides will also be included and might be helpful for booking reservations on your own.

For the bargain hunter, the hotel is very near the Tanger Outlet. Of course, the Hospitality Room and Ship's Store will be open long hours all through the reunion. Hang out there and renew old friendships - many surprises are being planned to make it more than a "bull session" - you'll love it!

The Patriots Point tour will allow plenty of time to explore the *USS Yorktown*, *USS Laffey* and the *USS Clagamore*. You can buy a casual lunch on the *Yorktown* at a concession stand on the hanger deck, or enjoy a more substantial meal in the CPO mess. At approximately 14:30, the bus will leave for the Citadel, the famous military college. This part of the tour is optional. Anyone not wishing to stay for the parade review need not disembark; they will be bussed back to the hotel to rest up for the evening activities. For those who do stay, there will be a half hour break to stroll around the grounds before the parade starts at 15:45. At 16:30, the bus will return to bring everyone back to the hotel by approximately 17:00.
