

This issue's Fiske Mate. ST1 Ron White, shares his memories from the 1967 Mediterranean Cruise, and how the Fiske became trapped in the Red Sea when the Six Day War between Israel and Egypt resulted in the blockade of the Suez Canal:

"The whole purpose of this cruise was to "show the flag" as we steamed around the Mediterranean; playing war games, visiting friendly ports, etc. That was our intention.

The CO announced that our port visit to the island of Malta would serve as an important event in promoting and strengthening maritime partnerships with European nations. Few of us really cared. The only question in our minds was "were the girls friendly?" Later, some said 'yes', others didn't comment. The whole episode is sort of hazy to me so I can't go into any detail. Probably just as well.

Intentions aside, Egypt and Israel had different ideas. Due to escalating conditions between them over who would control the Suez Canal, our Malta liberty was brought to a close and Fiske was ordered to transverse the canal. Now! But since some of the crew was still on the island, we

waited until the following day to leave.

Leaving Malta behind, we made for Port Said, the point where all ships wanting to transit the Suez had to wait. This included the USS Dyess (DD-880) which transited some days after us. Port Said was a fueling station for ships that passed through the Suez. There was no liberty - just get in line and wait - a favorite past time it would seem. The Captain then took the opportunity to remind us that the next few days (days? little did he know!) would be used to "protect US shipping interests and also monitor all ship traffic in and out of the Persian Gulf."

As we left Suez Port, we headed through the Gulf of Suez for the Red Sea, our patrolling area. And there we stayed. The big difference between the Panama and Suez Canals is that the latter has no locks because it's too flat. Therefore when it was Dyess's turn everyone was surprised at the greeting received from the citizens along the banks.

The tension between the UAR and Israel was known, but it was felt that the "flag-showing" missions were far removed from expressions of hostility. No incidents marred her transit, although protesters followed the ship in boats wherever they could and shouted jeers from the banks along the canal. Subsequently all military objectives along the canal were bombed by Israel, thereby cutting us off from the Sixth Fleet.

The Red Sea turned out to be our Med Cruise."

Historian's Report

A majestic ship was she, hat sailed the seven seas, we were her crew, we saw it through, and logged our history.



n late August I had the privilege of visiting the beaches of Normandy where so many of the 'Greatest Generation' fought and died. It is one thing to see the grainy old newsreels or the B&W photos in a book. It is entirely another thing to stand on the very sand on which they landed.

The landings spelled the beginning of the end for the Thousand Year Reich. Once those beach heads had been established it was no longer a

matter of 'if' but 'when' Nazi Germany would be defeated. Yes, it took almost another year to end the war, but that end became a certainty the moment that the walls of *Festung Europa* were breached. Granted the *FISKE* was not a part of the vast armada that made the landings possible; but, she would have fit right into the pictures taken that day of destroyers defending the LST's and troop ships from air attack, or shelling the German shore batteries with her 5" mounts much closer to shore than the

battleships and cruisers.

It was a thrill to be there a few short months following the 70th anniversary of that memorable date in June. The tour company I was with had a nice ceremony at the US cemetery above Omaha Beach with flowers, the National Anthem and Taps. I pray the heroics and sacrifices made that day - and every other day between December 7th, 1941 and August 14th, 1945 - never be forgotten.

M.S. Naval History The War of 1812

Did You Know?

From the Editor

That the United States declared war for the first time in its young history to protect ''free trade and Sailors' rights'' and that the Star Spangled Banner was written 200 years ago in 1814?

'America's Navy: Keeping the Sea Free Since 1812.'

Congress and President James Madison supported a declaration of war against England on June 18, 1812. Our small U.S.Navy took on the world's most powerful fleet and, through successful ship-to-ship action, proved its importance to our national security.

The War of 1812 was indeed the second war of independence, as freedom of the seas was the core cause. Britain threatened American rights by prohibiting U.S. exports, blockading U.S. ports, and impressing American Sailors into the Royal Navy. Out manned and out gunned, the U.S. Navy had only 15 warships, 62 gunboats, and 1,000 officers and men. In contrast, the Royal Navy had

600 ships and 130,000 men.

Major events during war included the destruction of the *HMS Guerrierre* which earned the *USS Constitution* the nickname of "Old Ironsides"; the Battle of Lake Erie, where Oliver Hazard Perry uttered the famous phrase "We have met the enemy and they are ours", a defeat in.



Maryland, which allowed the British to burn thenation's capital and the White House in September 1814; the Battle of Baltimore, in defense of Ft. McHenry that inspired Francis Scott key to pen the Star Spangled Banner; the signing of the Treaty of Ghent on December 24, 1814, and unofficially ending with the Battle of New Orleans on January 8, 1815.

2014 Marks the 200th Anniversary of America's National Anthem

QUICK FACTS ABOUT THE STAR-SPANGLED BANNER FLAG

The original Star-Spangled Banner, the flag that inspired Francis Scott Key to write the song that would become our national anthem, is among the most treasured artifacts in the collections of the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History in Washington, D.C.

- Made in Baltimore, Maryland, in July-August 1813 by flagmaker Mary Pickersgill, it was Commissioned by Major George Armistead, commander of Fort McHenry.
- Originally 30 feet by 42 feet, today it measures 30 feet by 34 feet. This is because in the late 1800s, souvenirs, or relics, of important events and people in American history became highly

prized and collectible objects. The Star-Spangled Banner, historic and celebrated, was subjected to this practice.

- There are fifteen stars and fifteen stripes (one star has been cut out).
- The flag was raised over Fort McHenry on the morning of September 14, 1814, to signal American victory over the British in the Battle of Baltimore; the sight that inspired Francis Scott Key to write "The Star-Spangled Banner".
- The flag was preserved by the Armistead family as a memento of the battle, and first loaned to the Smithsonian Institution in 1907; it was then converted to permanent gift in 1912 and has been on exhibit at the National Museum of American History since 1964.
